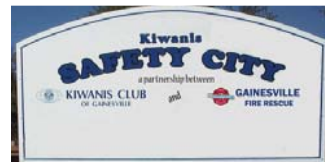
Get Involved!

History

The planning for Kiwanis Safety City began in 1996. What you see today is the culmination of over 10 years of planning, fundraising, building and curriculum development. Site construction at Kiwanis Safety City began Jan. 11, 2001. Safety City is located near the Gainesville Fire Rescue Administration building located at 1025 NE 13th St., Gainesville, Fla.

Teaching Stations

1. The **City Hall/Fire Station** is the principal classroom on site. The building is equipped with audio-visual aids to teach fire safety behaviors. Risk Reduction Specialists teach the dangers associated with fire play, the importance of smoke alarms and escape plans.



2. The **Bike Safety Gas Station** is the center for learning bicycle safety. The building serves as a storage area for bicycles, small electric cars and bike safety gear. The large concrete pad in front of the building will include mock gasoline pumps. Students have the opportunity to practice their newly learned skills in a safe, controlled environment.



3. The **Main Street Intersection** is the heart of Kiwanis Safety City. There are functioning traffic signals, crosswalks, bicycle lanes and street markings. Students learn to identify the dangers associated with crossing a street and how to properly use crosswalks.



A ribbon cutting ceremony was held on Feb. 27, 2002 to celebrate the grand opening of the first three teaching stations, which was well attended by Kiwanis, Gainesville City and Alachua County officials, Fire Rescue personnel and other City department staff.

4. In September 2002, the **GRU Safety Power Station** was completed on site. Instructors now have a strikingly realistic electrical substation to aid in teaching electrical safety.



5. An Entry Pavilion, known as the **Hope Powell Pavilion**, was constructed by our local Gainesville Fire Rescue firefighters. It serves as the gateway to Kiwanis Safety City. The Hope Powell Pavilion is where students assemble and get ready for their day of learning and fun.
